MISSION: ELITE TEAMS IS AN EXTREME DISCIPLESHIP AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAM DESIGNED TO IMPACT AT RISK INDIVIDUALS.

BACKGROUND

- ELITE TEAMS STARTED IN A LITTLE TOWN IN LANCASTER PA. WITH YOUNG MEN AND WOMEN WHO WERE LIVING A LIFE DESTINED FOR DESTRUCTION BY THEIR OWN ADMISSION. THEY WERE AT THE STAGE OF DETERMINING RIGHT AND WRONG, AND CHOOSING DIRECTION FOR THEIR LIVES. FOR THE MAJORITY, THAT DIRECTION WAS LEADING THEM TO INCARCERATION.
- Our methods have opened doors to work with young people and young adults in Central America destined for life in the gangs. Also, our mission has taken us to various gang prisons in Central America. Our desire is that none would perish, that all would come to an understanding of right and wrong and lead others to follow the same journey.
- WE HAVE SEEN THE POTENTIAL IN THESE YOUNG PEOPLE, AND ARE EXCITED TO TELL THE STORIES OF LIVES COMPLETELY CHANGED.
- THIS JOURNEY HAS BEEN FORGED THROUGH THE FIRE AS A VIABLE PROCESS TO AFFECT REAL CHANGE. WE HAVE SEEN THIS THROUGH OUR MANY LEADERS, WHO ARE STILL WITH US TO THIS DAY.

NORTH AMERICA: HOMICIDE/CRIME RATE

- Youth violence negatively impacts youth in all communities—urban, suburban, rural, and tribal.
- 1 in 5 high school students reported being bullied on school property in the past year.
- Youth violence kills and injures. Homicide is the third leading cause of death for young people in the United States from ages 10-24.
- The year-over-year increase in the U.S. murder rate in 2020 was the largest since at least 1905 and possibly ever, according to <u>provisional data from the CDC</u>. (Final data is not expected to differ much from the provisional data.) There were 7.8 homicides for every 100,000 people in the United States in 2020, up from six homicides per 100,000 people the year before. The rise in the nation's murder rate last year far exceeded the 20% increase measured in 2001, which was driven by the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11. (pew research center)
- Over the past two years, homicides and gun assaults trended upward while most property crimes receded. In the first half of 2022, crime patterns partially reversed, in particular, homicides and gun assaults declined while property crimes rose.
- At year end 2020, an estimated 5,500,600 persons were under the supervision of adult correctional systems in the United States, 11% fewer than at the same time the previous year (adjusted for persons on dual correctional statuses). (Gramlich)

HONDURAS: HOMICIDE RATE

- IN 2021, ALMOST 39 HOMICIDES WERE COMMITTED PER 100,000 INHABITANTS IN HONDURAS. This is the second consecutive year that the murder rate falls below 40 per 100,000 population since 2014, which was the deadliest year in the indicated period, at 66 homicides per 100,000 residents.
- COMPARED TO OTHER COUNTRIES AROUND THE WORLD, HONDURAS IS STILL ONE OF THE MOST VIOLENT PLACES IN THE WORLD WITH A HOMICIDE RATE OF 44.7 PER 100,000, IN 2019 VIOLENCE HAS LONG RULED HERE. THIS CENTRAL AMERICAN COUNTRY ACTUALLY HAS ONE OF THE HIGHEST MURDER RATES IN THE WORLD. DRUG TRAFFICKING GANGS, CORRUPTION, AND EXTREME POVERTY KEEP HONDURAS DOWN.
- IN 2021, A TOTAL OF **3,897 HOMICIDES** WERE REGISTERED IN HONDURAS, AN INCREASE OF AROUND SEVEN PERCENT COMPARED TO THE **3,623** CASES REGISTERED A YEAR EARLIER. THE HIGHEST NUMBER IN THE INDICATED PERIOD WAS RECORDED IN 2012, WITH 7,172 HOMICIDES. (Homicide rate in Honduras 2021)

Extreme Mentorship Training Overview

Elite Teams uses a training style and methods that guide young people and train them to be leaders in their own environments. We use methods of team-building evolutions, physical training, verbal instruction, discipline, and character development.

Elite Teams hopes to become an important tool to tackle the problem of increased violence impacting the lives of our young people.

Elite Teams Key Prevention Strategies

Prevention efforts should aim to reduce factors that place youth at risk for perpetrating violence and promote factors that protect youth at risk for violence. In addition, prevention should address all types of influences on youth violence: individual, relationship, community, and society. Effective prevention strategies are necessary to promote awareness about youth violence and to foster the commitment to social change.

Youth violence prevention continues to advance rapidly. Our prevention tools have been developed and implemented; many of these prevention programs and strategies have been evaluated and **found to be effective** at preventing violence and related behaviors among youth.

Evidence-based programs have shown positive effects in rigorous evaluations. (*Prevention strategies*)
